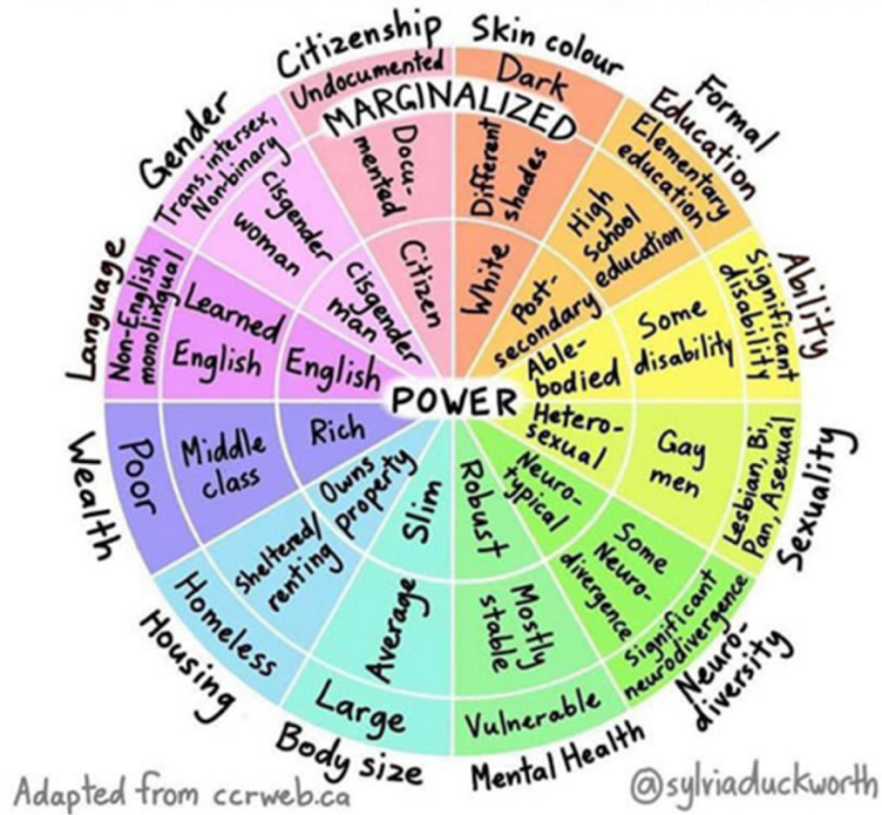


WHEEL OF POWER/PRIVILEGE



Here you'll see this wheel of power and or privilege. On the outer ring of the wheel you'll see the identities that are most marginalized. As you move inward on this wheel you'll see the identities that hold the most power. For example, if we look at the part of the wheel that says citizenship, those who are undocumented immigrants are the most marginalized. However, those who are citizens hold the most power. We can also look at housing. Those on the outer part of the wheel who are homeless are more marginalized than those who own property and therefore hold more power.

Consider on this wheel how a person with a disability can be more marginalized than someone who is able-bodied. I also encourage you to think about how combining various parts of the wheel can either oppress or empower a person. Consider that someone who has multiple identities on the outer part of the wheel can experience heightened levels of discrimination and oppression, whereas someone who has multiple identifiers in the middle part of the wheel has more opportunities to experience power.
